We support nearly 6,000 jobs that pay \$477 million in wages annually. Indiana's beverage companies have a direct economic impact in the state of \$4.3 billion. More than 1,800 of those good-paying jobs are in trucking, manufacturing, bottling, and more.

Hard-working families are already faced with higher costs everywhere. Limiting a business owner's ability to offer discounts will raises prices even more. Families shopping around for a bargain won't be able to find one. Allowing government to control beverage prices is a slippery slope. What is to stop government from regulating discounts on all kinds of groceries and products? As prices for everyday groceries continue to climb, this bill will make it even more difficult for families to find the prices that fit their budgets. It's government overreach, and it hurts working families.

Protecting the free market in the state will protect jobs and maintain the livelihoods of thousands of hard-working people. House Bill 1109 is just too expensive for Indiana's working families and small businesses.
